



If the Christian story is to live again in ways that will truly bless the world, we need to access the world of the unconscious, the unus mundus, where we and all things are one. The shepherds were unusual heralds of the birth of the Christ child. They were not wealthy, influential or politically important. They lived simple, often lonely lives. But their presence at the manger is a sign of hope – that we can all experience moments of spiritual joy and awakening. The shepherds went away 'glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen...'(Luke 2:20). We too are called to celebrate the moments of hope in our own lives: times of unexpected kindness from others; moments of inspiration and insight; experiences of solitude and contentment; times of excitement and wonder.

Love is born


Love is always born

## The Advent Gift of Hope

Though the human body is born complete in one moment, the human heart is never completely born. It is being birthed in every experience of your life. Everything that happens to you has the potential to deepen you. It brings to birth within you new territories of the heart. (O'Donohue, 1997, p. 26)

The Magi came to Bethlehem armed with knowledge. They possessed great understanding of astrology and prophecy and this led them to the manger and the Christ child. Theirs gifts were symbolic and underscored their conviction that they were in the presence of a great king. It was their hearts, however, which were challenged by this experience. The biblical story tells us that they worshipped and then went home a different way to avoid Herod's murderous plans. They were changed by the journey and their encounter with Jesus.

## The Advent Gift of Wisdom

Pause for Reflection

What events in your life have nourished your heart with the gift of wisdom?

We need to open the treasures of wisdom in traditions other than our own. Not only do they have much to teach us, but they also hold the key to unlocking depths within our own religious inheritance that we know nothing of as yet.

(Newell, 2014, p.122)

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St Francis first introduced the tradition of the nativity scene. It brought into focus for him the Light that he saw in the earth and in every creature, the light of 'Brother Sun' and 'Sister Moon' as he called them in his Canticle of the Sun... (Newell, 2014, p. 37).

In contemplating the nativity scenes which appear in churches, homes and sometimes public places during Advent, do we see what St Francis saw – the sacredness of every created being? And if we see this then we need to work for a '...rebirthing of the sacred within us as nations, as religious traditions, as communities and families, we need to move into relationship with those who are considered unlike us. From this new birth emerges' (Newell, 2014, p.98).
