Catherine McAuley could have been insulated and isolated against the miserable poverty of Dublin. Gifts given were gifts for others. Direct and practical in her response, she went out into gutter and garret to teach, to soothe and to shelter. Leader

Mary Ann Scofield, RSM describes Catherine McAuley as a “woman who allowed the experiences of her life to speak to her; and she listened for ministry out of this discernment... She was quick to be flexible and quick to respond to need: all with a deep faith in the providence of God working in her and forming and re-forming her according to the changing needs of the people whom she saw around her.” (*“Toward a Spirituality of Mercy”*)
